

S. W./C. L. Clouser, (Died 2 May 1907), Patriot, Friday, May 3, 1907; Maryville Man's Fall From Wagon Causes Quick Death

Marysville, May 2. – **S. W. Clouser**, the junior member of the firm of Felix and Clouser, dealers in feed, flour and wood, met death here in a singular and tragic manner at about 6 o'clock this evening.

Mr. Clouser had loaded a wagon with baled hay at the firm's warehouse and was taking it to the store when at a street corner, the wagon caught on a hitching post and the jar threw **Mr. Clouser** from the driver's seat to the ground, where he was pinned by several of the bales of hay, which also had been jolted off.

While he was in that helpless position one of the horses stepped on his face and broke both of his jaws. He was dead almost before he could be extricated from his position, a matter of about two minutes, and an examination by a physician disclosed the fact that his neck had been broken by the fall. Either of his injuries would have caused death it is said.

Mr. Clouser was about thirty-five years old and leaves a **widow** and one **child**.
