Robert L. Cromleigh, 55, of 130 N. High Street, Duncannon died Monday of injuries suffered in an automobile accident.

A Duncannon businessman was killed Monday night when the 1873 Ford truck he was driving collided with an unattended parked vehicle.

**Robert Lee Cromleigh**, 49, of 130 N. High Street, was pronounced dead at the scene by deputy coroner Elmer Tanner.

State police said **Cromleigh** was traveling north on Route 11-15 about one mile north of Duncannon when his truck struck a "mobile home hauler" parked "close to the roadway." State police said.

The parked vehicle was owned by Jim's Marine and Travel, Sayre, PA.

The Duncannon Fire Company assisted at the scene of the accident.

**Cromleigh** was in the sheet metal and tinsmith business.
