

**Charles Daniels, (Died 19 Jun 1904)**, Wilkes Barre Times, Monday, June 20, 1904 Horrible Death At A Steel Mill –

Duncannon, Pa., June 20. – A red-hot bar of iron came out of the rolls with terrific force here yesterday and wriggled its way instantly clear through the body of **Charles Daniels**, who died in half an hour.

It was the most distressing mishap that had ever been witnessed by the many men employed at the Duncannon Iron Works. It took place in the guide mill, where **Daniels**, who was only nineteen years old, was employed as a catcher.

Standing ready, eager and expectant with his tongs to catch the red, writhing, serpent-like bar and guide it back as the rolls should reverse, imagine his awful surprise and that of his fellow workers when the iron suddenly took an upward twist and curve, and darted through his abdomen and then back again to the reversing rolls, while he simply wilted down to the ground with scarcely strength to shriek in his agony.

Tenderly lifted and borne out to the fresh air by his companions, **Daniels** was given the speediest medical attention, but all was unavailing. His vitals had been burned beyond the possibility of recovery.
