

**Cora R. (Billman) Ebright**, April 21, 1943, Newspaper Clipping, The Perry Historians, **Mrs. Elmer Ebright**

**Mrs. I.S. Billman**, of Spring Township received word of the sudden death of her cousin, **Mrs. Elmer Ebright**, at her home in or near Delmont, South Dakota, March 20, 1943. **Mrs. Ebright** was the former **Miss Cora Billman**, of near Dellville. **Mr. Ebright** was also from there. They went west nearly forty years ago. Their family, consisting of boys and girls, all grew to manhood and womanhood, and all are in homes of their own. Her brothers are **Charles**, in Donna, Texas, an extensive fruit grower; **Harvey**, at Presho, South Dakota, a retired landowner; **George**, in California, a real estate dealer; **Daniel**, in Dakota; **Elizabeth**, who spends her winters in Texas and summers in Dakota, is the widow of **Samuel Zeigler**, of Dellville; **Mary, Mrs. John Comp; Mr. Comp** is a brother of Crist Comp, who died recently, and **David**, who died some time ago.

**David** and **Mrs. Ebright** were the youngest two children of **Daniel** and **Rebecca (Wagner) Billman**.

The morning of the day of her death, as was her custom, she made the fire and swept the porch and sat down near the stove and said, "I am so dizzy," and fell from her chair unconscious. She was taken to a hospital but could not be brought out of the coma and died the same day.

She will be remember as a slender girl, but was a woman of nearly three hundred pounds. She was never known to be ill and her sudden death is a severe shock to those who loved her. She was a cousin of **Miss Mary Wagner**, of Alinda.
