

**Adaline S. (Stroup) Endslow**, (5 May 1844 – 11 Jun 1935), Newspaper Clipping, The Perry Historians

**Mrs. Adaline S. Endslow** died at the home of her daughter, **Miss Elsie Endslow**, Spokane, Washington, June 11th, at the age of 91 years, 1 month, and 6 days. She was the daughter of **Judge George** and **Arabella Stroup**, born one and a half mile east of Blain, where she was reared to womanhood.

In 1868 she was married to **William S. Endslow**. The young couple then moved to what is known as **Endslow's Mill**, where they resided until 1908 when they moved to Blain. In 1912 they went west and made their home with their daughter until the time of her death. **Mrs. Endslow** had the misfortune, in 1924, to fall breaking one of her hip bones. From this accident she recovered sufficiently to walk about on crutches until 1929, since which time she has been able to get about only in a wheelchair. Because of the hardening of the arteries her eyesight was impaired and for the last year has been almost blind. Despite her frailty, she continued cheerful through all these years, winning the admiration of her friends by her fortitude.

In her home she was a devoted wife and mother, a good neighbor and friend and will be missed not only in the home but by her relatives and friends. It may well be said of her "None knew her but to love her, none named her but to praise."

She united with the Lutheran Church at the age of 16, and was an active member until her departure for the west, when she affiliated with the Central Methodist church in Spokane.

She is survived by one daughter **Elsie M. Endslow** of Spokane, Washington, four sons, **George S. Endslow** of Mt. Joy, Pa. **James S. Endslow**, of Chicago, Ill.; and **A. W. S. Endslow** and **Samuel S. Endslow**, of Spokane.

Funeral services were held Friday June 14th by the Rev. Ray S. Dum, Formerly of Landisburg, Pa. her pastor, officiating. Interment was in the beautiful Riverside Park Cemetery, beside her husband who preceded her in 1924.
