

**Samuel M. Eppley**, (Died 9 Sep 1927), Newspaper Clipping, The Perry Historians

This community was shocked at the sudden death of **Mr. Samuel Eppley** at his home on Myrtle Avenue without warning. He was a railroader having been retired by the Pennsylvania Railroad in 1912 after long services with that part of the system known as the N.C.R.R. He was a former gang leader on of the car inspectors and at the time of his retirement was then gang foreman and was known by all the Baltimore Division and Sunbury Division train crews.

He is survived by three sons and four daughters, **Arthur G.**, **Charles M.**, and **Harold Eppley** all of town, **Mrs. William Harrison**, Baltimore, Md.; **Mrs. Monte Callaman**, of New York City; **Mrs. Clarence Scott** of near Pittsburgh; **Miss Mable Eppley** at home.

**Mr. Eppley** had been a familiar figure in town having taken an active part in the community having filled several borough offices as well as his interest in railroading. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at 2 p.m., from his late home. Rev. W. H. Wright, pastor of the First Church of God at Altoona and a former pastor of the local church here officiated with burial at Chestnut Grove Cemetery
