

Elizabeth (Cromleigh) Jones, (Died 12 Aug 1908), Peoples Advocate and Press, August 19, 1908

After many months of sickness **Elizabeth**, age 58, beloved wife of **Robert C. Jones**, a carpenter of Duncannon, passed away Friday morning of last week. Her end was peaceful and came after a night of restlessness when in a chair death claimed her quickly.

The deceased was the daughter of the late **David** and **Susanna (Emminger) Cromleigh** and was born in Mechanicsburg, Pa. She is survived by one brother, **Sobnleski Cromleigh**, of Parkersburg, Pa. She was joined in wedlock with **Robert C. Jones** of Duncannon, **March 14, 1882** and he survives her without issue. She was a sister of the late lamented **Jas. P. Cromleigh** of Duncannon.

Before marriage for a number of years she was a successful school teacher and had endeared herself to many children who have grown up and became men and women and who recall with gratitude the influence who exerted over them toward the higher ideals of life.

Mrs. Jones' sphere of influence was especially felt in church circles where she was ever active in every good word and work. To her, the dedication to her Master's service meant more than a call; it was a command that in his fulfillment she found the greatest pleasure; and all associates in the various activities of church work were inspired by her zeal and willing service. The influence she extended was a strong personal force that enlarged as it was exerted. Thus her death is a great loss to her church, the Presbyterian, to which she united in young womanhood, and the vacant chair in the Sabbath School will also with difficulty be filled. In the Home Mission work **Mrs. Jones** was especially interested particularly in southern fields and annually for many years boxes and barrels of clothing, etc., were sent at Christmas to that section through her thoughtfulness and kindness, aided by like minded fellow members.

Mrs. Jones while she realized that her condition was serious was hopeful to the last. Whilst the insidious disease made inroads upon her never strong constitution and her failing condition was noted with sadness by her friends, yet she bore her affliction without murmur of complaint, satisfied that it was God's will. A good woman has gone to her reward--an immortal crown. Saturday afternoon her remains were laid to rest amid floral tributes sent by sorrowing friends, in the Presbyterian Cemetery, above Duncannon, her former pastor Rev. J. N. Wagenhurst, now of Harrisburg, officiated.

Relatives and friends were present from Harrisburg, Philadelphia, Cincinnati, Wilmington, Del, New Bloomfield, Newport, and other places.

May she rest in peace.
