

William Alfred Myers, (18 Oct 1859 – 22 Oct 1927), The Evening News, October 28, 1927;
Two Fall Dead near Palmyra

Two men died suddenly from heart attacks, near Palmyra, yesterday morning in less than two hours' time.

They were **William Alfred Myers**, 67, of 107 East Portland Street, Mechanicsburg, and William Semback, an aged recluse who had lived in a small house about a half mile from the Bradley-Palmyra stone quarry.

Myers, a retired railroader, dropped dead while working on the State Highway, near Palmyra. Later, the body of Semback was found in a field near his home.

Surviving **Myers** are his widow, **Mrs. Elizabeth Myers**, three daughters, **Miss Mary B. Myers**, at home; **Mrs. Margaret C. Shatto**, of Shermansdale, and **Mrs. Florence A. Fahnestock**, of Mechanicsburg; two sisters, **Mrs. Annie Dromgold**, of Duncannon, and **Mrs. Nellie Clouser**, of Mechanicsburg; one brother, **Henry G. Myers**, of South Hanover, and ten grandchildren.

The body may be viewed at the home between 7 and 9 o'clock tomorrow evening. Funeral services and burial will be at a New Bloomfield church, Sunday afternoon.

He had been a member of the I. O. O. F. and the Junior Order of Mechanics.
