

Frank Rupley, (2 Nov 1859 – 2 Apr 1922), Patriot News, April 3, 1922; R. R. Telegrapher Dies On Street Car - **Frank Rupley**, Who Was Employed by Pennsy for Many Years, Succumbs at Marysville

Frank Rupley, about 50, telegrapher for the Pennsylvania Railroad, and stationed at Lemoyne, dropped dead in a Valley Railways street car as the car stopped at the end of the line at Marysville, **Rupley's** home.

Rupley was sitting near the rear of the car. **Harry Raysor**, also of Marysville, was sitting in the seat ahead of him. As the car pulled into Marysville, **Raysor** saw **Rupley's** head nod and then **Rupley** pitched forward. **Raysor** picked him up and found he was dead.

Dr. George W. Gault was summoned and he took **Rupley's** body to his home to await the arrival of the coroner. **Rupley** is supposed to have died of heart failure. He had been employed by the Pennsylvania Railroad for many years, and was returning home from work when stricken.

Mr. Rupley was well known in Masonic circles of the State. He served as treasurer of Perry Lodge No. 453 M. and A. M. for a number of years.
